I. Interaction with the Organizer

A. Reception Arrangement of Shanghai Fudan University

Departing from Taipei Songshan Airport on the 22nd of November, we took our two-hour flight to our destination, Shanghai. Immediately after landing, we were warmly welcomed by volunteer Krystal from Fudan University. On the way to the university via the transportation provided by the school, we talked with the volunteer about the competition and the process of it. We found out then that the way the contest works this year is completely different from previous years. The ten teams that participated will be broken up and our teammate will be randomly selected!



B. Interaction with Contestants and volunteers

During the few days of the competition, Fudan University's arrangements for the event were not as intense as previous years, it gives students sufficient time to prepare. After the speech contest on Saturday morning, we have our lunch in the cafeteria of Fudan University; the organizer gave each of the participants 40 dollars RMB coupons per meal, which was more than enough to cover for our food selection. Throughout the two days, we have many opportunities to get to know the Fudan volunteers,



and we have a deeper understanding of the life of the students there, such as what

is the curriculum arrangement of Fudan's English Department, as well as what it is like to live as a student in China. These are all completely different from our lives at Chengchi University.

C. Feedbacks from Judges and Speakers of Fudan University

In addition to the outcome of the competition, we also pay attention to the opinions of the many different lecturers or experts Fudan University invited to act as judges for the contest, these feedbacks have greatly improved our speaking and debating skills; the suggestions also made me rethink my debate model as well as the structure of my speeches.

II. Schedules

A. Arrangement and Schedules for the Talent Cup Contest

The trip in Shanghai is mainly divided into two parts, the two-day speech and debate contest in Fudan University, and a day of cultural experience in Shanghai. On the first day of the Talent Cup, we had a preliminary round for the speech contest and two debate rounds. On the evening of the same day, Fudan University arranged an inter-university culture exchange night to encourage interactions and understanding of students between different schools through performances and interesting games. The next morning, the third debate round was held, and the contestants who entered the speech final was announced as well as the teams that break into the debate final. Sunday afternoon is the most exciting part of the Talent Cup, the finals! Because the team members of the debate team did not know each other before, the finals were a little less competitive and the overall atmosphere more relaxed and fun.

B. Visiting Kid Castle and ZhuJiaJiao

After the competition, we visited the headquarters Kid Castle, one of the major sponsors of the Talent Cup. Kid Castle is an English educational business started in Taiwan. After the introduction by the vice president of the Shanghai branch, we had a deeper understanding of the development and trend of the supplementary language education business in Shanghai. After that, everyone went to Zhujiajiao, a famous ancient town in Shanghai, where we saw many traditional Shanghai buildings and tasted Shanghai's unique delicacies. It was a very

impressive experience! Finally, the alumni from the respective schools in Taiwan dined with us that evening. Listening to the seniors sharing their experiences and life in Shanghai broaden our horizons!



III. Feedbacks

A. Talent Cup Format Feedback

The Talent Cup this year is not what I originally thought. For the past few years, different schools debate with one another with the goal of winning the final victory. This year, to be honest, after hearing that the organizers were going to split us apart, I couldn't believe this is how Fudan wanted the competition to be. If they really split us into different teams, how am I supposed to work with complete strangers in a contest that requires utmost teamwork? But at the day of the match, I found out that though my teammates have different

experiences in debates, they all have the courage and willingness to express their opinions and communicate with each other. After two debates, we have narrowed the awkwardness between us and really started to work as a team. In the end, though breaking up and redistributing the team greatly reduced the competitive nature of this competition, it fulfilled the crucial purpose of the Talent Cup and promoted exchanges and communications between students on both sides of the strait.



B. Speech Contest Feedback

In addition to the debate contest, another highlight of the Talent Cup was the speech competition. I was fortunate to be chosen as one of the contestants, and the only Taiwanese student, to enter the final with the second highest score from the preliminary round. In the final round, I saw methods and ways of different students to prepare for their impromptu

speeches. I also found that the focuses students from Shanghai put on their speeches were different from those of Taiwanese students. Rather than integrating their own experience into the storytelling, Shanghai students express their arguments in a passionate way, with the usage of large numbers of quotes from the past scholars. This different portrayal of the art of speech really opened my eyes on how speaking in public can be approached through different aspects.



C. Culture Experience Feedback

During the five-day exchange, what impressed me the most was the visit to Zhujiajiao. Because I have a passion and interest in Chinese historic sites, after knowing that the Cultural Experience Day will include a trip to an old town of Shanghai. I am very excited. The experience of the day did not disappoint me. Walking along the street of the hundred-year old Zhujiajiao, I



have a different understanding of the city, Shanghai. Instead of tall, modern buildings, when I think of the city now, I also remember the traditional houses in the older part of Shanghai. In addition, I also tried the renowned Shanghai traditional delicacy, Begonia cakes, which is very different from the snacks back in Taiwan! In conclusion, the trip to Shanghai, other than the improvement of my speech and debate skill, I also have a deeper understanding of Shanghai's students, their life and culture. This is truly a fulfilling experience!
